POWERING THROUGH THE PANDEMIC

The worldwide onset of the COVID-19 pandemic has changed our way of life — the way we work, the way we socialize, the way we live.

The success of our fatherhood initiative is largely based on building relationships of trust with the men we serve. For many, we are a vital link to managing their daily lives. As calls for shutdowns and social distancing were administered, we quickly adapted our approach to service delivery to maintain that vital link. Here are some of the ways we have managed to stay connected:

■ Prior to stay-at-home orders being necessary, peer group sessions continued while practicing social distancing but as health guidelines tightened, we transitioned to virtual group sessions. Technology provided a relatively easy transition to keep group discussions engaging and productive.

Participation remained steady and even increased in some locations. This was partly due to participants who struggle with transportation issues being able to join discussions via cell phone.

With curriculum workbooks and PowerPoints already in place, participants had the means to follow virtual presentations and stay current with assigned exercises.

Our intervention specialists maintained contact with enrollees through phone calls, emails, and social media, helping them stay focused on personal goals and providing emotional support during these stressful times.

With many of our referring agencies forced to suspend services, we ramped up our social media presence and virtual outreach and recruitment to keep enrollment of new participants active throughout the year.

Program participants received encouragement and education through online videos, e-news, text messaging to keep them informed and focused on their goals.

To emphasize our Parenting and Co-Parenting curriculum, the Center coordinated a statewide effort to assemble and distribute nearly 300 father/child activity bags to enrolled fathers who have access to their children. Each bag contained a variety of items including card games, jump ropes and mini-garden seed pods. Fathers who drove by for curbside pickup across the state also received parenting tips and a note of support. ■ For fathers who lost jobs, our job coaches provided support to get them re-employed with companies hiring, such as Amazon. Online job skills training was encouraged to help fathers be better positioned for new employment in a post COVID-19 environment.

Some of our fatherhood organizations had their WIFI signal boosted so that program participants could join in group sessions from the safety of their cars in the parking lot. Meals, which are usually a part of each session, were bagged and delivered curbside for fathers and their families.
